□	<i>Arnoglossum atriplicifolium</i> (= leaf like <i>Atriplex</i>) (awr-no-GLOSS-um)	Asteraceae (Senecioneae tribe) [CC4]	Pale Indian Plantain (leaf underside white)
□	<i>Arnoglossum reniforme</i> (= lamb's tongue, kidney-shaped) (awr-no-GLOSS-um)	Asteraceae (Senecioneae tribe) [CC8]	Great Indian Plantain (leaf kidney-shaped)
□	<i>Broussonetia papyrifera</i> (= to bear paper) (broos-o-NESH-ee-uh)	Moraceae [intro]	Paper Mulberry (we didn't see this, but we talked about it and its paper-making use)
□	<i>Campanula americana</i> (kam-PAN-yoo-luh)	Campanulaceae [CC4]	Tall Bellflower (the plant we found was scrawny, but it still had a flower)
□	<i>Campsis radicans</i> (bent [stamens] + rooting stems) (KAMP-sis)	Bignoniaceae [CC3]	Trumpet Vine (opposite / aerial rootlets / capsules / teeth)
□	<i>Carva illinoiensis</i> (KAYR-ee-uh)	Juglandaceae [CC7]	Pecan Hickory (falcate leaflet shape)
□	<i>Celastrus orbiculatus</i> (= circular) (sell-ASS-trus)	Celastraceae [intro]	Oriental Bittersweet (differs from native by rounder leaves, fruit in terminal clusters)
□	<i>Cercis canadensis</i> (SIR-sis)	Fabaceae (Caesalpinoideae subfam) [CC3]	Redbud (each leaf has 2 pulvini for movement, one on each end of the petiole)
□	<i>Cirsium altissimum</i> (= highest) (SR-see-um)	Asteraceae (Cardueae tribe) [CC4]	Tall Thistle (leaves without lobes)
□	<i>Cuphea viscosissima</i> (= stickiest) (KOO-fee-uh)	Lythraceae [CC4]	Clammy Cuphea (sticky stems / John said flowers are amazing when magnified)
□	<i>Elymus hystrix</i> (= porcupine) (ELL-uh-muss)	Poaceae (Pooideae subfamily) [CC4]	Bottlebrush Wild Rye ()
□	<i>Euonymus atropurpureus</i> (good name + dk purple) (yoo-ONN-i-mus)	Celastraceae [CC5]	Wahoo (pink fruits were not quite ripe)
□	<i>Euonymus fortunei</i> (= good name) (yoo-ONN-i-mus)	Celastraceae [intro]	Wintercreeper (Robert Fortune brought us an unfortunate plant)
□	<i>Euphorbia cyathophora</i> (= cup-bearing) (yoo-FOR-bee-uh)	Euphorbiaceae [CC4]	Painted Spurge / Fire on the Mountain ()
□	<i>Galium circeazans</i> (= enchanting) (GAY-lee-um)	Rubiaceae [CC4]	Licorice Bedstraw (4 leaves in whorl)
□	<i>Galium concinnum</i> (= elegant, well-arranged) (GAY-lee-um)	Rubiaceae [CC4]	Shining Bedstraw ()
□	<i>Helianthus mollis</i> (sun + flower + soft) (hee-lee-ANN-thus)	Asteraceae (Heliantheae tribe) [CC6]	Ashy Sunflower (dried-up and ash-colored, some damage from decapitating weevils)
□	<i>Hypericum sphaerocarpum</i> (above + picture + round fruit) (hy-PAYR-i-kum)	Hypericaceae [CC5]	Round-Fruited St. John's Wort ()
□	<i>Ilex decidua</i> (= deciduous) (EYE-lex)	Aquifoliaceae [CC5]	Possomhaw / Deciduous Holly (spur branches useful for identification)
□	<i>Liquidambar styraciflua</i> (liquid + amber + flowing with resin) (liquid-AM-bar)	Altingiaceae [CC6]	Sweetgum (leaves maple-like, but not opposite)
□	<i>Liriodendron tulipifera</i> (lily + tree + tulip bearing) (leer-ee-o-DEN-dron)	Magnoliaceae [CC7]	Tulip Tree (planted)
□	<i>Lindera benzoin</i> (= aromatic resin) (lin-DEER-uh)	Lauraceae [CC5]	Spicebush (male plants have conspicuously larger buds for next spring's flowers)
□	<i>Menispermum canadense</i> (moon + seed) men-eh-SPERM-um	Menispermaceae [CC4]	Moonseed (no tendrils / leaf shape varies greatly)
□	<i>Morus</i> (didn't identify to species) (MOHR-us)	Moraceae []	Mulberry (had 3 different leaf shapes – like sassafras)
□	<i>Parthenocissus quinquefolia</i> (virgin + ivy + five + leaf) (parth-in-o-SISS-us)	Vitaceae [CC3]	Virginia Creeper (climbs with suction cups)
□	<i>Pycnanthemum tenuifolium</i> (dense + flower + slender + leaf) (pik-NANN-thuh-mum)	Lamiaceae (Nepetoideae subfam) [CC4]	Narrowleaf Mountainmint ()
□	<i>Pyrus calleryana</i> (PY-rus)	Rosaceae [intro]	Callery Pear ()
□	<i>Quercus imbricaria</i> (overlapping like tiles) (KWERK-us)	Fagaceae (red group) [CC3]	Shingle Oak ()

<input type="checkbox"/>	<i>Ratibida pinnata</i> (feather) (ruh-TIBB-i-duh)	Asteraceae (Heliantheae tribe) [CC4]	Gray-Headed Coneflower ()
<input type="checkbox"/>	<i>Rhus aromatica</i> (= fragrant) (ROOS)	Anacardiaceae [CC4]	Fragrant Sumac (this shorter species flowers before leafing / pointed leaf / stronger fragr.)

<input type="checkbox"/>	<i>Ruellia strepens</i> (= making noise) (roo-ELL-ee-uh)	Acanthaceae [CC3]	Smooth Wild Petunia ()
<input type="checkbox"/>	<i>Sideroxylon lanuginosum</i> (iron + wood + woolly) (SY-dr-o-ZY-lun)	Sapotaceae [CC5]	Gum Bumelia (has both thorns and spurs)
<input type="checkbox"/>	<i>Smilax bona-nox</i> (good night) (SMY-lax)	Smilacaceae [CC3]	Saw Greenbriar (stem prickles spaced / edible)
<input type="checkbox"/>	<i>Smilax tamnoides</i> (<i>S.hispida</i>) (resembling <i>Tamus</i> , a yam plant) (SMY-lax)	Smilacaceae [CC3]	Bristly Greenbrier (lower stem prickles crowded and black)
<input type="checkbox"/>	<i>Solidago gigantea</i> (so-lid-DAY-go)	Asteraceae (Astereae tribe) [CC3]	Giant Goldenrod (leaves and stems smooth, hairless)
<input type="checkbox"/>	<i>Solidago ulmifolia</i> (elm + leaf) (so-lid-DAY-go)	Asteraceae (Astereae tribe) [CC4]	Elmleaf Goldenrod ()

<input type="checkbox"/>	<i>Symphyotrichum cordifolium</i> (heart + leaf) (SIMM-fee-o-TRY-kum)	Asteraceae (Astereae tribe) [CC7]	Blue Wood Aster (leaves heart-shaped & sharply-pointed)
<input type="checkbox"/>	<i>Symphyotrichum lanceolatum</i> (spear-shaped) (SIMM-fee-o-TRY-kum)	Asteraceae (Astereae tribe) [CC3]	White Panicked Aster ()
